
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First thing first:

- Understand your School's Cost of Attendance and what your gaps are.
- Make sure you know your school's policy on how outside awards impact any institutional awards you are receiving.
- Can you lose loan eligibility?



WHO ARE YOU?

- Think individually, academically, locally and globally.
- Multiple identities (circles of my multiple identities) female, mother, veteran, religious affiliation, fraternity, sorority, service memberships, gay, athlete, differently abled, first-generation college student, educator, Taoist, genderqueer, scientist, or any descriptor with which you identify.
- Geographically where do I have (or had) residency
- Research/Academic Interests

Tick Tock goes the clock:

How much time do you really have?



You must decide how much time to put into a scholarship search, because there's no guarantee it will yield results.


- Do you have one hour or five?
- Limit your search and application process to that amount of time.

Get Organized:

- Create a Excel Template (example below)
- Know when scholarships are due (often earlier than anticipated)

Every Little Bit Counts



Larger Scholarships are more competitive

Consider applying for smaller scholarship awards, which tend to be less competitive, and are also less likely to use strict cutoffs for grades and test scores.

Have your application ready to go:



- Always have a resume and your transcripts ready to go.
- Spellchecker is never enough.
- What do you want to be when you grow up? Have a statement ready
- Make it easy for others to help you. When you ask for letters of recommendation, always provide a resume, most recent transcript, and a brief statement of your career goals. You can also provide an addressed, stamped envelope for your recommenders as well.

Gratitude:



Be certain to send a thank you note or email to the scholarship committee, as well as to your recommenders for taking the time to write a letter on your behalf.
